

Alberta Population Report

March 27, 2008

Fourth Quarter, 2007

POPULATION ESTIMATES

In 2007, Alberta's population growth remained the strongest among provinces, but the rate of increase was substantially slower than in 2006. Alberta has now had two consecutive quarters of negative interprovincial migration. However, the net inflow of international migrants has remained strong for the year of 2007.

Table 1 provides the population estimates and annual growth rates for Alberta and Canada. As shown in this table, Alberta's population was estimated to be 3,497,881 on January 1, 2008. This represents an annual growth of approximately 67,700 persons (or 1.97%) during the year of 2007, comparing to a growth of 105,100 people (or 3.16%) in 2006. Although the Alberta population growth rate of 1.97% in 2007 was the lowest in three years, it was still nearly double the national average of 1.05%.

Table 2 presents the population estimates and growth rates for all provinces and territories. The annual population growth rates for the year 2007 are also included. As revealed in Table 2, Saskatchewan and British Columbia had the next largest growth rates among the provinces at 1.67% and 1.50% respectively.

MIGRATION

During the fourth quarter of 2007, Alberta experienced an interprovincial migration loss of 880 people, as compared to a gain of 11,810 in the fourth quarter of 2006. This is the second consecutive quarterly interprovincial migration loss since the fourth quarter of 1994.

As shown in Tables 3 and 4, the continued high outflow of migrants to British Columbia and Saskatchewan was the main reason that Alberta had a negative interprovincial migration in the fourth quarter of 2007. Alberta also had small net outflow of migrants to other provinces with the exception of Ontario and Quebec. However, the net outflow of Alberta's 880 interprovincial migrants in this quarter was more than offset by the net inflow of 3,930 international migrants moving into Alberta.

On a yearly basis, for 2007 the top three provinces enjoying the highest interprovincial migration gain were: British Columbia (13,390), Alberta (10,630) and Saskatchewan (10,170). This was the first year in ten that Alberta was not the first among provinces in net interprovincial migration. In 2007, the interprovincial migration net inflow (10,630) for Alberta was only 18% of last year (58,170).

NATURAL INCREASE

Between October 1 and December 31 of 2007, Alberta experienced a natural increase (births minus deaths) of approximately 5,600 people. The province had 11,100 births and 5,500 deaths in the fourth quarter.
