

Alberta Population Report

September 29, 2008

Second Quarter, 2008*

*** Please note that Statistics Canada has revised historical figures to incorporate today's release of the 2006 Census net under-coverage.**

POPULATION ESTIMATES

Alberta's population growth continued to be the highest among all provinces in the mid-year of 2008, though slower than the previous twelve months. During the second quarter of 2008, Alberta had strong net inflows of people in both interprovincial and international migration, and a substantial influx of non-permanent residents.

As of July 1, 2008, Alberta's population was estimated to be 3,585,142 (Table 1). This represents a yearly increase of approximately 74,300 persons (or 2.11% growth) since July 1, 2007. Although Alberta's population growth for the past twelve months was the lowest in four years, it was still 80% higher than the national average of 1.17%.

Population estimates for July 1, 2008 for all provinces and territories and the growth rates since July 1, 2007 are provided in Table 2. As shown in this table, British Columbia and Saskatchewan had the next highest growth rates of 1.65% and 1.63% respectively.

MIGRATION

In the second quarter of 2008 (April 1 to June 30), Alberta had the largest interprovincial migration gain in Canada (Table 3). The province gained 6,730 people in interprovincial migration, as compared to 4,680 in the previous second quarter. The bigger interprovincial gain in this quarter was primarily attributed to the higher net inflow of migrants from Ontario (3,860) and Quebec (2,160), and at the same time the net outflow of Albertans to Saskatchewan (540) and British Columbia (160) was slowing down.

Between April and June of 2008, Alberta's international migration remained very strong with a net inflow of 6,340 international migrants choosing this province. In addition, the net number of non-permanent residents hit a record high level of 7,100 in the second quarter in response to Alberta's labour shortage.

NATURAL INCREASE

During the second quarter of 2008, Alberta posted a natural increase (births minus deaths) of over 7,400 people. The province experienced 12,500 births and 5,100 deaths in the second quarter.
